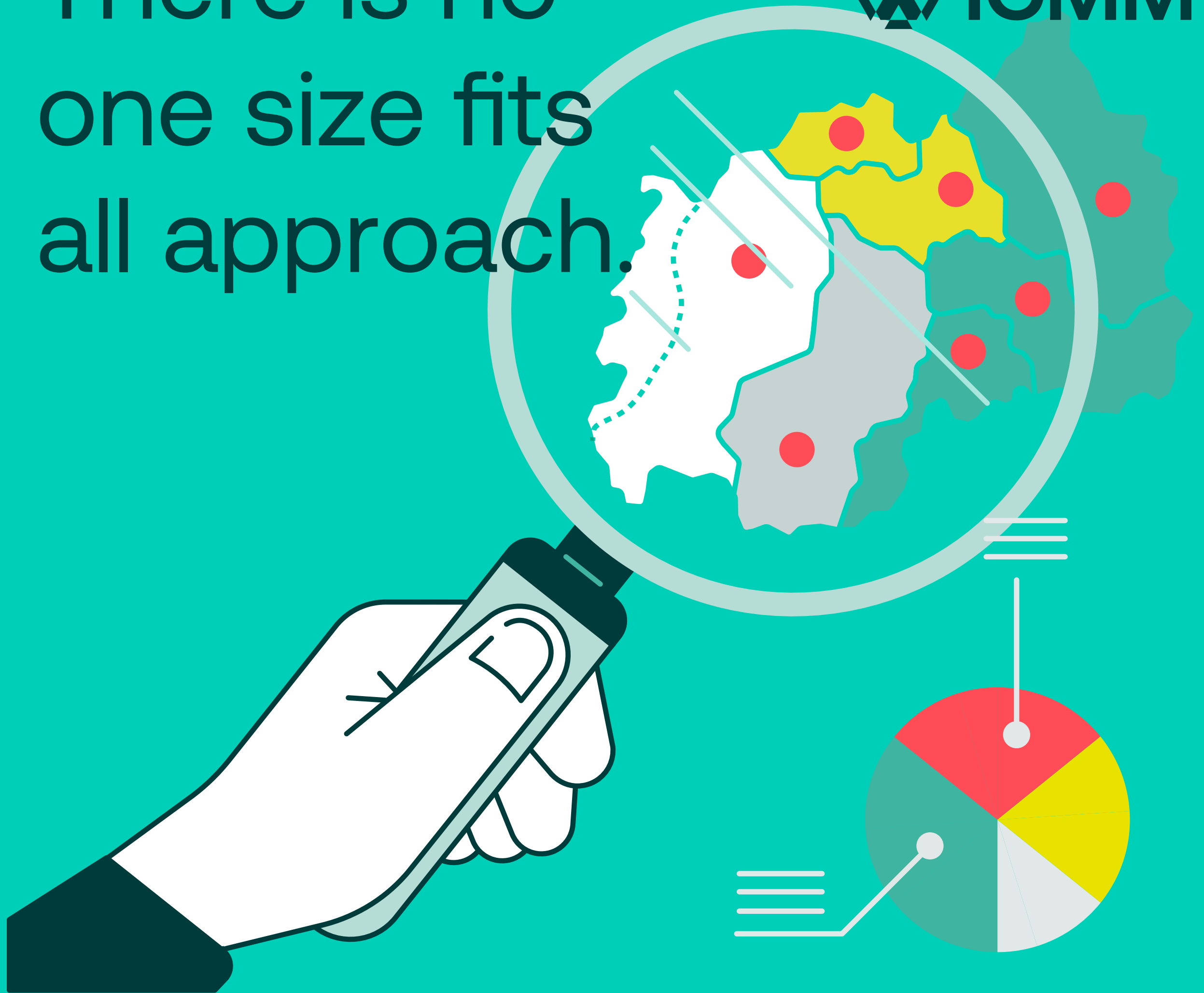

In these collaborations, mining companies play different roles, such as convenor, co-participant, process lead, and advocate.
